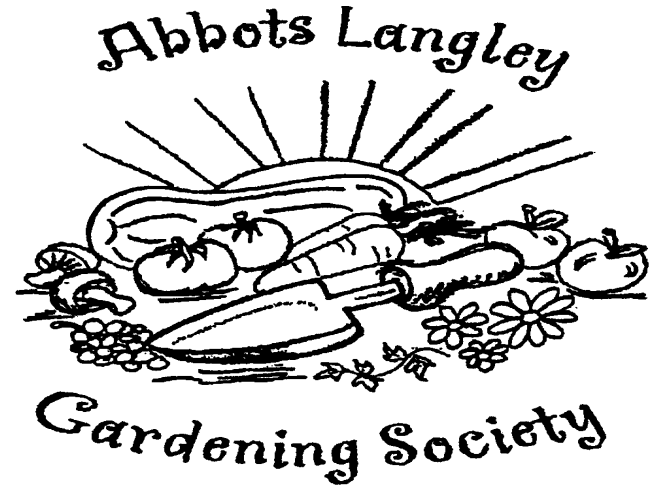

  - 5 Please ensure that Entry Forms for **Young Exhibitors** have their first or familiar name, instead of using initials, and please enter their age. *Please ensure that they enter in the correct class/age group (see page 12).*
  - 5 All entries for **Young Exhibitors'** (i.e. those aged between 4 and 12, who are either the child or grandchild of a fully paid up member) are free, **except** if they enter the adult classes. Also Young people aged 13 or over, may enter classes 1-130 where the normal entry fee will be required.
  - 7 Completed Entry Forms together with the fees may be handed to the Secretary up to and including the last **Tuesday** prior to the show.

### The Challenge Plate

Will be awarded to the family scoring the highest number of points (donated to the Society by the Chairman of Three Rivers District Council 1985)

1. Entries are confined to the named member as shown on the membership card, except where otherwise stated.
2. All exhibits shall be from plants which have been grown by the exhibitor for at least two months immediately preceding the show, except in decorative classes. The Committee reserves the right to inspect the gardens or plot of any exhibitor.
3. All exhibits must be staged between 7.30am and 9.45am on the day of the show. No exhibits will be allowed in after this time, and the hall will be cleared by 10am to enable the judging to commence. Cups and prizes will be presented and the raffle drawn at approximately 4.30pm, after which time exhibits will be removed.
4. The Committee cannot except responsibility for plates, dishes, and vases etc., provided by the exhibitor. A selection of vases will be available on the morning of the show.
5. Only one exhibit will be permitted in any class from any one member, except for the Wine Classes (see "rules" page 9).
6. It is the responsibility of an entrant to stage their own entries. An entrant may request the assistance of a Show Steward, but it is not the responsibility of a Show Steward to actually stage an entry for an entrant/exhibitor.
7. Judges will be appointed by the Committee and their decisions in accordance with Royal National Rose Society, Royal Horticultural Society, 1996 National Association of Flower Arranging Societies Handbook of Schedule Definitions, National Federation of Women's Institutes, National Dahlia Society and National Chrysanthemum Society Rules. (a copy of the R.H.S. Handbook is available for consultation from the trading depot, or at the Henderson Hall on the day of the Show, from the Secretary).
8. The judge's decision will be final.
9. Judges shall have the right to reduce or withhold awards according to the standard or number of exhibits in the classes.
10. Only stewards appointed by the Committee will be permitted to enter the showroom during the judging of the exhibits.
11. The holder of the trophy will keep their award safely in their possession. The Society has insurance cover for the trophies and if stolen, lost or damaged, the Secretary must be informed immediately. If the holder moves out of the district, the holder must inform the Secretary to arrange for the return of the trophy prior to moving.

**PLEASE NOTE** : THE TROPHIES WILL BE HELD BY THE RESPECTIVE WINNERS FOR THE ENSUING YEAR AND MUST BE RETURNED TO THE SECRETARY, MRS JANE LAY, **BEFORE 25 AUGUST.**

**PLEASE ALSO NOTE** : Young exhibitors may enter adult classes, but the entry fee is then payable. A young exhibitor is defined as a child or grandchild, aged between 4 and 12 years, of a fully paid up member of the Society.

## Rules

### Wine and Beer (81– 90 inclusive)

- All bottles must be polished prior to exhibiting i.e. no dirty marks or smears on the glass.
- Up to three different entries in each class may be entered by one member but separate entry forms must be used.
- Wines can be of any age and may be made from a kit.
- Wines must be exhibited in clear, colourless bottles. The bottle should have a punted bottom.
- Corks must be flanged (“T” shaped)
- Labels will be provided – do not use other wine labels for showing. The labels must show the Exhibit number and Class number.
- Liqueurs to be made by natural fruit process and spirit.

### Decorative (101–110 inclusive)

*Please note: flowers and foliage from any source are permitted. Any container may be used unless otherwise stated. Plant material must predominate.*

***Please double check your measurements before leaving your exhibit to be judged.***

### Household (111–130 inclusive)

- Metal lids may be used instead of cling film, but must be neatly painted over to obscure the maker’s name and other maker’s markings.
- Plain 450g jars must be used, preferably filled to the top. The use of other types of jar e.g. “Roses”, is not permitted.
- Jam jar lids must not be rusty and glass should be clean.
- Metal rings must be taken off bottled fruit.
- Exhibits must not be shown warm or frozen inside.
- Please note that most exhibits must now be made to recipes provided at the depot/website. See page 11.**

### Young Exhibitor (131– 150, 231-250)

- All children in the family may compete, but the minimum age is four years, and the maximum is age 12. Each entry must be the entrant’s own work.
- Entries will be judged within two age groups (see page 12)

***Please encourage your children to take part. Each entrant will receive a small prize.***
